### JUSTIFICATION

- Project targets 4,500 smallholder vegetable farmers
- 65% of these beneficiaries are living below 2 US Dollar a day.
- Their main source of livelihood is crop production, of which, tomato production contributes significantly.
- Against this, they have lost hope, as a result of the Bacterial wilt disease.
- Those who invested in Greenhouses infrastructure for tomato production have abandoned due to the disease.
- Most farmers have abandoned tomato production.
- As a result, youths have migrated from the village to urban areas, in search for better job opportunities, due to failed tomato enterprises.
- Poverty has deepened as a result of reduced incomes.

# **PROJECT GOAL & OBJECTIVE**

Improving Wealth, Nutrition and Resilience through sustainable production of Grafted Tomatoes, with 4,500 beneficiaries in Uganda.

- S0 1: Mobilization, Situation analysis and assess prevalence of bacterial wilt and socio-economic impact of the disease in key tomato producing districts in Uganda: 2017
- SO 2: Screen tomato rootstocks for Bacterial Wilt tolerance in Uganda: 2017
- SO 3: Commercialised Grafted tomato seedling production with youths through Young Plant Risers (YPR) Nurseries: 2017/19
- SO 4: Improve the capacity of 4,000 smallholder tomato farmers for commercial production of grafted tomato fruits in Uganda.: 2017/19
- SO 5: Create awareness on the potential of grafted Tomato technology through knowledge development and dissemination: 2019

#### **PROJECT ACTIVITIES**

- Mobilization, Situational analysis, mapping and Baseline assessment (Year 1 (2017))
- Screen tomato rootstocks for Bacterial Wilt tolerance in Uganda (Year 1 (2017))
- Commercialised Grafted tomato seedling production with youths through Young Plant Risers (YPR) Nurseries (Year 2 & 3 – 2017/18)
- Improve the capacity of 4,000 smallholder tomato farmers for commercial production of grafted tomato fruits in Uganda.
- Create awareness on the potential of grafted Tomato technology through knowledge development and dissemination.

## **PROJECT OUTCOMES**

- Occurrence and distribution of the disease is mapped and Socioeconomic impact of the disease assessed.
- Bacterial wilt resistant tomato root stocks identified and tested through screening
- Youths are engaged in commercial bacterial wilt tolerant grafted tomato as a business case, and producing 1.2 million seedlings per season.
- Smallholder farmers have become resilient and adopted Good agricultural practices in bacterial wilt resistant grafted tomato varieties
- Stakeholders across the country have been sensitised and have knowledge of the existence of bacterial wilt resistant grafted tomatoes in Uganda.
