Together with other CGIAR research programs, we contribute to all Sustainable Development Goals, with more focus on:





Some actionable big-picture findings from 2016-2018

Structural transformation is slowing down—poor countries that are now agricultural are likely to remain so in the decades ahead

The biggest agricultural challenge of climate change is not food security, but job security; especially in the Horn of Africa and the Sahel

Reducing food loss and waste (SDG 12.3) is good for the environment, but has little impact on global hunger

Post-harvest loss in the developing world is a misnomer—loss occurs along a continuum, and much is pre-harvest or during


Social protection boosts household income and food security, but alone is not sufficient to address child malnourishment

Social protection can reduce intimate partner violence

Women own more land than the 1% number often stated. Individual holdings are high, and joint holdings higher still. Security of tenure and rights to use are important, and get less attention than ownership.
